

All students must attend school every day and be in school until 12:35.

For students who have study in the afternoon, they may choose to have this study at home. This facility can be removed if there are concerns over progress, attendance, punctuality or other areas of 6th form expectations.

Students may leave site at break, during lunchtime or at any point in the afternoon where they have free time. Whenever a student leaves the site they MUST sign out using the signing out system in the 6th form Quiet Room.

Attendance:

If you are unable to attend school, it is your responsibility to contact Miss Carroll to explain why. You can do this via e mail or by texting the sixth form phone (07539 366293). Miss Carroll will contact home to confirm absence.

It is also your responsibility to ensure any work that you miss is caught up in a reasonable timeframe by discussing the work missed with your subject teachers.

Where attendance is an issue, form tutors will contact home to discuss how we can help improve the situation. Ongoing/long term absence will require a meeting with parents—and in rare circumstances—your place in Sixth form could be removed.

Punctuality:

It is both a matter of professionalism and respect that you attend all sessions identified above in a prompt and timely manner. Late to either registration or lessons can cause disruption to the planned activities and can hinder both yours and others' progress. Punctuality will be monitored and where it does not meet the schools high standards further discussions and meetings to discuss next steps will take place.

Electronic Devices

Sixth Formers will use a range of electronic devices as part of their study. This may include laptops, tablets and mobile phones.

Free Wi-Fi:

School offer free Wi-Fi to students, which can be accessed using the signing in process that is available in the sixth form Quiet and Silent Rooms. Any student using the school Wi-Fi need to adhere to the acceptable use policy and ensure that no inappropriate websites are accessed on their devices using school internet. This includes sites that may be currently in our devices memory (cookies) that will then become active when in the building and signing onto the school network. Students must therefore ensure that they have checked their devices before bringing them on site and accessing the school Wi-Fi.

Mobile phones can be used in the sixth form centre and, at the discretion of the teacher, in classrooms. If asked, students should put phones away during lessons.

Use of Laptops/Tablets for work:

Laptops/tablets can be used to access work, make notes and all other activities associated with study. However, if students choose to use electronic devices to make and store notes, they must do so in a manner that is in line with a subject's expectations. For instance, if in Biology, it is expected that you store notes in a folder—with a particular folder structure—then you must store your work in the same structure on your electronic device and be prepared to show your work when folder checks are scheduled.

Microsoft Office 365:

Students are issued with an Office 365 account for school use. Use of email and other applications must fall within the appropriate use of IT policy.

All subject areas will have a Teams site associated with your class, in which teachers will share a range of resources. You may be able to take photos of work in class—if it is with the permission of the teacher.

Recording:

Under no circumstances should a student record, through audio or video—any aspect of lessons taking place. This would result in other students being recorded and is therefore a GDPR and safeguarding issue.

Printing

Printing is available for free, with students being allocated printer credits for use with the printer in the Sixth Form Silent Room. If you run out of printer credits, please see Miss Carroll who will top your credits up for you (within reason!).



There is no set uniform that students must wear.

We expect students to wear casual clothing that is sensible and does not have any inappropriate or offensive slogans, images or writing.

Travel

Free travel is provided between SJF and our partner schools—St Margaret Ward and St Thomas More.

Working with two other local secondary schools gives us a much wider range of subjects available to our students and gives increased flexibility in terms of subject combinations.


The mini bus collects and drops off outside of the school Library. Miss Carroll will be present for both the am and pm sessions to register students and ensure any necessary communications or messages are passed on.

If the weather is too cold or too wet, students may wait just inside of the library entrance.



Punctuality


Punctuality is essential as it will not be possible for the mini bus to wait and delay the drop off of other students. Please make sure that you arrive with plenty of time for your timetabled departure time. Persistent lateness that impacts the transport of other students may result in you having to find your own transport to partner schools. You would then potentially have to also deal with the associated cost implications of this transport.



Independent Study

Probably the most important factor that will determine the level of success you have is how much work you do outside of your timetabled lessons. Independent study comprises of 4 key areas:

- 1. **Reading over work completed in lessons**—reading over your notes, making the occasional annotation or highlighting sections is key to ensuring you have understood the work as you go along. If you find that there are areas that do not make sense, it is imperative that you take action. This could include asking your peers to go over work as a study group or talking to your teacher and seeking help.
- 2. **Reading around your subject**—this includes reading periodicals, revision notes online, watching You Tube videos on your topic, reading other textbooks etc.
- 3. Completing Homework/Assignments— Your teachers will set homework every week. Some of this will be based around assignments (especially for coursework subjects or technical qualifications) and a lot will be based around application of knowledge from lessons, such as answering exam questions or carrying out recall activities. The quantity of homework will vary from subject to subject and over the course of the two years, depending on what other commitments (such as mock exams) are on at that time.
- 4. **Revision**—everyone is different in terms of how they carry out revision. However, one tried and tested process that we recommend students follow is the information cycle shown below. This works as well for small unit tests as it does for larger mock exams and final end of Y13 examinations:



Study Requirements

A typical student will study three subjects and so will have, across the fortnight, 20 free periods. A typical timetable will look something like this:

Students are free to use their afternoon (periods 4 and 5) study sessions to study at home. All morning sessions must be conducted in school. This privilege may be revoked if data indicates that either attendance, effort or attainment are a concern. Progress meetings would follow such data triggers and it may be decided in that meeting that afternoon sessions were required for intervention work and support.

Study can be done in either the silent study centre or in the sixth form Quiet room.



The silent room is supervised independent study which takes place in our purpose build study centre where there are computers and printers as well as a range of university prospectuses for the current year.

The quiet room is more for group study where students may work together on homework, projects or revision. Alongside a smaller number of computers the Quiet room has access to the tuck shop and Sixth Form Kitchen




All students must spend a minimum of 3 hours per week in the silent study room doing independent study. If you choose to spend more time there you may, or you might wish to spend the remainder in the quiet room working with other students.

Mentoring

All students can expect to get mentoring during their study in St John Fisher Sixth Form. There are four tiers of mentoring available:

- 1. **Basic/All student:** 6th Form form tutors will form the first level of mentoring. Monday morning registrations are dedicated to weekly planning and review of progress. Form Tutors have access to regular data checks, engagement scores and attendance information and will routinely discuss these things with students in the form. As time progresses they will also be the first point of contact to write references for university and apprenticeship applications.
- 2. Progress Concern: Where data suggests that current attainment or progress is causing concern, students will be moved onto the next level of mentoring and will meet with one of the Sixth Form team. Barriers to progress will be discussed and an action plan put in place aimed at supporting learners to increase the rate of progress. Weekly or fortnightly check ups will take place through scheduled meetings. Time scales for this level of mentoring will vary but will be a minimum of a half term from the point at which it starts.
- 3. Aim High: Any student whose GCSE APS is 7.0 or above will automatically be put into a group known as the "Aim High" group. This group can also be joined by students who request to be added based on a desire to access particular courses. Mentoring from this group comes from the 6th form team and external agencies. Agencies such as Keele Medprep, Cambridge liaison etc will over the course of Y12 and Y13 touch base with this group to discuss how to successfully apply and gain a place in some of the more challenging and limited fields including Medicine and Dentistry, Law, Oxford and Cambridge and other Russel Group Universities.
- 4. **Wellbeing/Attendance**: Students who have been referred (by self or other) for pastoral issues that are affecting attendance and progress will have additional support and mentoring from Miss Carroll, our 6th Form Pastoral Leader. Where Attendance is the main area of concern, an action plan aimed at improving attendance will be followed and closely monitored. Where concerns are outside of attendance, Miss Carroll will work with the student and where necessary home, to access outside agencies that can provide the necessary specialist support.





Form Time

All students are placed into small registration groups who meet every morning. Form tutors ensure that there is someone who gets to know you very well, which is important when it comes to UCAS or similar references during Year 13.

A programme of activities run during form time that cover a range of areas geared towards supporting students with their wider skills, knowledge and access to further education and employment.

A typical fortnightly plan is shown below:

Enrichment Opportunities

Moving onto your next step after 6th form, whether that be university, apprenticeships or employment, will require you to somehow stand out from the crowd in order to be accepted onto what will be a limited number of places or contracts. Some of this will obviously be dependant on the grades you achieve in your qualifications, however much of it will also come down to you as a person and the experiences and skills that you have acquired over recent years.

Therefore, it is extremely important that you make the most of opportunities that are available to your in sixth form that will enable you to develop holistic skills such as communication, leadership, organisation and confidence building.

Enrichment comprises a range of whole year group activities and opportunities that you can sign up for. All students are expected to sign up for at least one enrichment opportunity in year 12.

Each year the opportunities will vary.

Sixth Form Council & Leadership Team

Each form group in Year 12 and Year 13 has a representative on the sixth form council. In September, students can nominate themselves and where there is more than one nomination, the form will vote for who will represent them.

The sixth form council will meet fortnightly in the sixth form Quiet Room during registration. The council will be led periodically be Mrs Threadgold, Mr Stevens and Miss Carroll.

Discussions will be based on upcoming activities and feedback from forms, including use of the suggestion box located in the sixth form Quiet Room. Where concerns or questions are raised, feedback will be given to the council no later than the following meeting and council representatives can then feedback to form groups during the next few registration days.

Sixth Form Leadership Team

Towards the end of Year 12, students can apply for a position on the Sixth Form Leadership Team. Application is through an online form that will be sent out to all Year 12 students in May of Year 12. Students must outline in their application what contributions they have made to the school community during their time at St John Fisher (either during Year 12 if new to the school, or longer if they were in the school before sixth form) and how they feel that they would support the school as a Sixth Form Leader.

If successfully admitted to the team, Sixth Form Leaders will be expected to help with the running of events such as; open evenings, parents evenings, meeting and talking to visitors and school interviews. They will meet with the Headteacher every fortnight during breaktime, to discuss school issues both within and outside of Sixth form.

The Leadership team is a great opportunity to develop a range of skills such as communication, organisation and obviously leadership—all of which will help prepare students for the next step in their education and/or employment.

EPQ stands for Extended Project Qualification. It is an enrichment qualification that can be studied alongside your other qualifications. You can spend between 30 minutes and 1 hour per week of timetabled study to achieve it.

An EPQ is an excellent taster of university-style learning as it is effectively an independent research project which can, but does not have to, relate to an A Level subject that is being studied. You will be able to pick a topic and question of your choice. This type of project is a university-style dissertation on any topic which can be researched and argued about - for example, a controversial biological, historical, ethical, philosophical, psychological, economic or environmental issue. The dissertation uses secondary research sources to provide a reasoned defence of a point of view, with consideration of counter-arguments.

Completing an EPQ helps you to develop a number of different skills, which are vital for university. By taking responsibility for the choice, design and decision making of an individual project you will:

- Become a more critical, reflective, and independent learner
- Develop and apply decision-making and problem-solving skills
- Increase your planning, research, analysis, synthesis, evaluation, and presentation skills
- Demonstrate creativity, initiative and enterprise

In addition to the skills outlined above, most universities look on the qualification in a very positive light. Many will discuss it with you during your interview and will use the points associated with the qualification to contribute to the points score you need to get a place on a specific course. Some Universities, if your project is aimed at the course you want to study, will lower the grade expectations they would usually have to allow you onto the course. 




Our PSHE curriculum has been especially designed to cover the key topics that are pertinent to 16-18 year olds and their journey into further education and employment. A lot of the work is discussion based and resources and links are age appropriate.

There is one formal PSHE session in registration each week, with a follow up debate/discussion in registration a few days later. Attendance (along with all am sessions) is mandatory.

Throughout the year, we monitor student voice through online surveys and through the sixth form student council. Feedback from these communication systems will often influence some of the content and activities covered in the PSHE curriculum. This ensures that students receive the advice and guidance that is most pertinent to the experiences they are currently facing.


Student Wellbeing

Sixth Form Gym:

Membership to the sixth form gym costs £2 per year (which is used to purchase cleaning wipes for the machines) and is available to all 6th form students at St John Fisher.

A short induction session, covering basic health and safety, must be complete before the Gym is accessible, as well as an induction form outlining students responsibilities (the form can be found at the end of this booklet).

The Gym is only accessible to Sixth Form students and teachers and is open to Sixth Form Students between 8:00am and 4:00pm.




The Gym is a great resource to use before school, during breaktime and lunchtime, during study sessions and after school—helping contribute to students physical and mental wellbeing.

Life Skills

During the two years of study, students will have access to a range of extra curricular activities that develop skills and knowledge outside of "traditional" academic pursuits. These can include sessions on finance (opening bank account, being aware of financial scams etc), as well as opportunities to develop cooking skills, ready for life away from home. Most of these sessions are delivered to ALL students as part of the extended curriculum.



Regular student wellbeing surveys help update and keep relevant the session that are delivered over the two year course.




Future Steps - UNIFROG



Students are given accounts on the online platform—UNIFROG, which is a "Universal Destination Platform". It has information on every university course, every apprenticeship and every further education course. It is packed full of information on career pathways and has lots of tools designed to help with application processes to all of the above destinations.

Fortnightly sessions during form time allows students to familiarise themselves with the information and tools available during Y12, culminating in them making their decisions early in Year 13 and beginning the application process.

Exploring pathways



Resources such as Webinars and MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses) give students access to experiences that can help better familiarise themselves with the finer details of certain careers. Participation in a MOOC is a fantastic way to enhance future applications to universities and other courses to establish your passion and commitment to follow a certain pathway. It could be the difference between being accepted on a course above other applicants or not receiving your place.

Next Step Preparation

Preparing for university, apprenticeships or employment begins from the day students start in Year 12 and runs through into after they have started their next stage of education or employment.

Preparation involves a range of activities including:

- Fortnightly timetabled registration sessions in the IT room to use UCAS and UNIFROG to research degree courses, career pathways and Apprenticeships.
- ♦ A range of Career visits throughout the two years, covering a diverse range of sectors.
- ♦ Attendance at a University Fayre—where students will have access to universities from around the country to discuss life at those institutions and the courses on offer.
- Visits to different types of universities. A minimum of two (and often more) to include a campus and city and a Russel Group university.
- ♦ Talks from local universities regards personal statement writing, student finance, accommodation
- Work experience week at the end of Year 12.
- ♦ Life skills—such as student finance and cooking skills.

Sixth Form—Next Step Days

Support with applications and next steps is ongoing throughout your two year study at St John Fisher. However, there are two days dedicated to looking at how the online application process for universities and apprenticeships works. During these two days, students will be supported in registering with the UCAS platform, navigating the wide range of information available and beginning to structure their personal statement and applications.

The days are supported by our links with local universities such as Keele and Staffordshire and representatives from these universities are on hand to help students look at what they need to do in their applications to stand out from the crowd.

These days take place at the end of Year 12, just before the weeks worth of work experience.







Work Experience

We work alongside a company called Employ Solutions to ensure that our students get support in accessing work experience placements which offer the best opportunity to students to gain the necessary links, experience and value from their week long work experience placement at the end of Year 12.

DON'T WAIT until the end of Year 12 to think about this. As you go through the year, consider the type of career that interests you and talk to us about arranging work experience as soon as possible.




